Did you know that ...

FPGV offers scholarships to members throughout the year? Or that you can remember or honor a member by donating to the scholarship fund?

AFPGV's scholarships, offered throughout the year for membership or professional development, are:

• The Meyers Scholarship Fund was started by the AFPGV board of directors in honor of Daniel M. Meyers and his contributions to the fundraising profession when he was recognized as "International Fundraising Executive of the Year" by AFP in 2000.

The Meyers Scholarship helps individuals serving not-for-profit organizations who want to develop their knowledge and skills; but cannot easily afford the cost of professional development. The Meyers Scholarship is awarded to two individuals each year so they can attend the annual Regional Conference. The scholarship covers the full cost of conference attendance for both recipients.

• The Jill Pranger Scholarship was established in honor of Jill's many accomplishments.

In 2006, Jill, a past president of AFPGV, was honored with AFPGV's Fundraising Executive of the Year Award. That year, she also achieved Advanced Certified Fundraising Executive (ACFRE) designation, an advanced certification held by only 100 people in the world. The scholarship is intended to encourage AFP professionals to pursue Certified Fundraising Executive (CFRE) designation. Two scholarships are awarded each year that cover 50% of the CFRE Review Course cost (\$390 for AFP members and \$490 for non-members). It does not cover any portion of the exam fees.

• Established in 2013, the Karen M. Gaffney Scholarship promotes and enhances the professional development of fundraising professionals by encouraging involvement and membership in the Genesee Valley Chapter of AFP.

Karen M. Gaffney, CFRE was a respected colleague and 2012 Clinger Award recipient. She was a strong supporter of the Genesee Valley Chapter, serving on the board of directors as treasurer at the time of her untimely passing in 2013 in addition to other service. She was passionate about fundraising, professional development and mentoring fellow development professionals through AFP.

In recognition of her significant contributions to the profession and the organization, the scholarship program was named in her honor by the AFP-GV board of directors. Two membership scholarships will be awarded each year, covering half of the cost of AFP membership.

• The **Ralph E. Chamberlain Scholarship** enables members to apply for funds to cover attending the **AFP International Conference**. This is given by AFPGV and AFP International to one individual, and is approximately \$1,600.

Donations to all of these funds in honor of Dan Meyers or Jill Pranger, or in memory of Karen Gaffney, are welcome. You can make your donation to **AFP**, **Genesee Valley Chapter**, and note that it is intended for one or more of these funds. You can also donate online.

Conference scholarship recipient offers lessons learned at BIG Gifts

ongratulations to Emily Marullo, development associate at Geva Theatre Center, recipient of AFPGV's 2014 scholarship to the annual Regional
Conference. Here are highlights of her experience.

What was one thing that surprised you about the BIG Gifts conference?

The diversity of professionals in the room. It was great to see a mix of young professionals, "accidental fundraisers," senior level staff and board members all in the same learning environment. I find the different perspectives of staff and volunteers extremely valuable.



Name one or two things you learned at the conference, even if it's just a quick tip.

No isn't "No" until it's been qualified four times! Mark Zawacki spoke about finding out why somebody said no. Is the amount too much? Is the timing wrong? Is the asset wrong? Is the area of interest incorrect?

What was your favorite workshop or topic or speaker?

I really enjoyed Michael Cooney's presentation. The examples of why and how to protect an organization from contingencies that could emerge from donor restricted gifts was though provoking. Also, I couldn't help but think Michael would be a great addition to Geva Comedy Improv!

What brought you into the field of fundraising?

During my freshman year of college, I traveled to Biloxi, Mississippi, as part of United Way's Alternative Spring Break program. I returned year after year and inevitably learned more about nonprofit careers. My volunteer work was recognized by the College at Brockport when I was awarded "Student Volunteer of the Year."

Through this award, I was introduced to the Division of Advancement staff at the college. I was about to start a master's program and they were looking for a graduate assistant. The stars aligned and that's when it all began! I was fortunate to work with an amazing team through my assistantship. They were extremely supportive and allowed me to explore different facets of fundraising.

How can you see being a part of AFP beneficial?

Besides having the opportunity to network & learn from my peers, I've found AFP to be a great support system. I left the #BIGgifts conference with a sense of purpose and empowerment.
